Council goes deeper on feral cat issue

Cheryl Hayes told the Staples City Council that getting feral cats spayed or neutered can be a better way to control the population than randomly killing the cats.

At the Nov. 12 council meeting, Hayes, a Staples resident and member of the PAWS animal rescue and adoption service, said that trapping the cats, getting them spayed or neutered, then releasing them back into the community allows them to occupy the habitat that might otherwise go to breeding cats.

“Trap and release is more effective than trapping and killing,” said Hayes.

Hayes thought one reason there is a bigger issue now is that a mild winter allowed more kittens to survive, and noted one cat who had 13 kittens. She said 10 of those kittens were spayed and neutered. Hayes said some of the cats that have been trapped are tame enough to adopt.

The council asked about the costs of getting surgeries for the wild cats. With the death of veterinarian Dr. Bridget King, Hayes said she was not sure if the PAWS group would continue at the same level they had done in the past.

Council member Mary Jo Goff said the people who feed the wild cats should be more responsible, saying that she considers people who feed the cats to be the owners of the cats.

“If you are outside feeding them, they’re yours,” said Goff.

Council member Doug Case also said there is a house full of cats in Staples and wondered if the Humane Society could be contacted to force some action.

Street assessments

The Council reviewed assessments for the street project on 2nd Ave. NE. A property assessment determined that the project increased the value of each home along the street

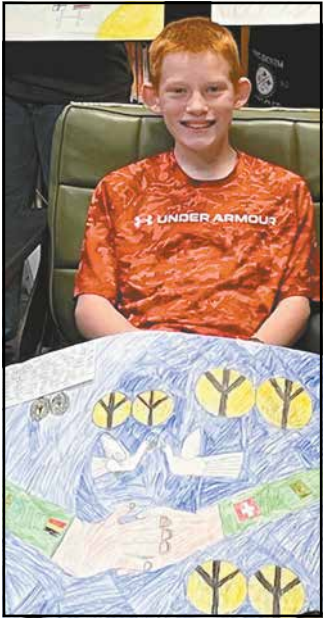
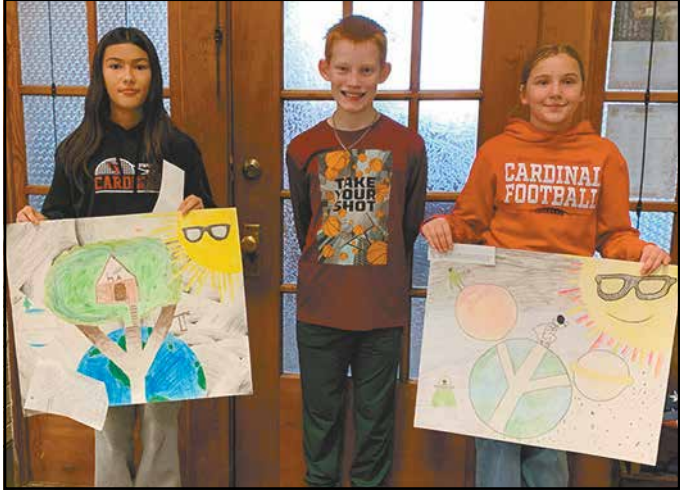

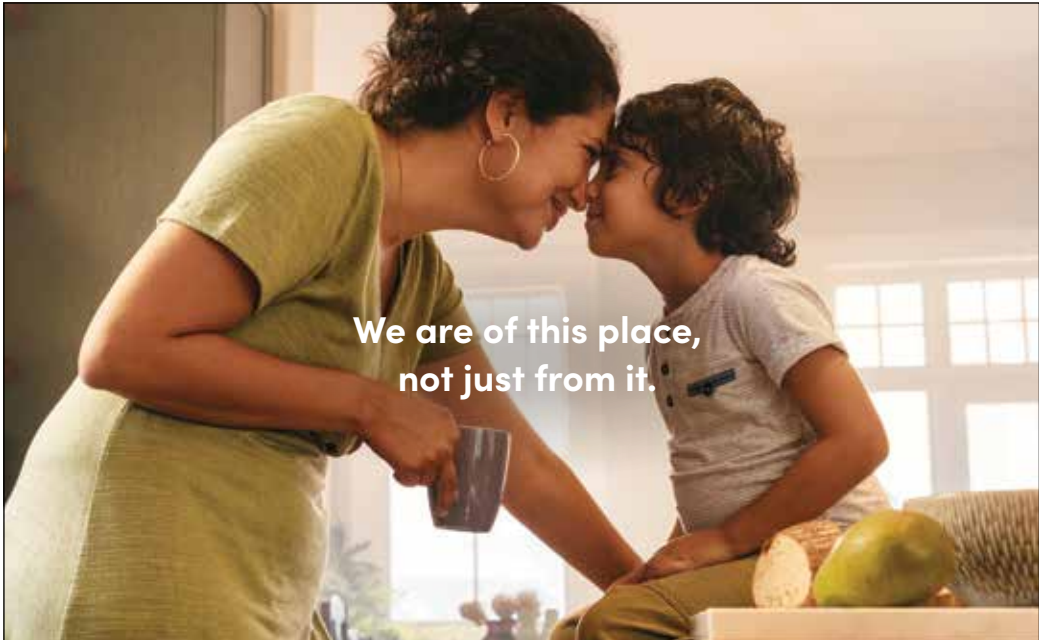

Instead of tariffs, let’s support policies that keep goods affordable and allow our economy to grow without unnecessary burdens.

Updates on the Wetland Conservation Act

From Todd County SWCD

As of August 1, the Minnesota State Legislature implemented new statute changes to the Wetland Conservation Act (WCA) which regulates wetland impacts. Relevant statute changes that could affect Todd County landowners regarding WCA exemptions are briefly summarized below.

- Agricultural activities – The exemptions regarding wetlands on agricultural lands that were cropped in six of the last ten years prior to January 1, 1991 and wetlands located on pasture land meeting certain wetland type and acreage requirements was removed. New update – for wetland impacts on agricultural land authorized by the

United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), a Certified Wetland Determination is required for the use of the Agricultural Exemption.

- Drainage – The exemption regarding wetlands on agricultural lands that were annually seeded or in a crop rotation with pasture grass, cover crop, or legumes for eight out of the ten most recent years prior to the impact was removed.

- De minimis (Wetland Fill) – Impactable wetland amounts (prior to requiring a replacement plan) were updated. New update – A replacement plan is not required for wetlands located outside the shoreland protection zone up to one-tenth acre (4,356 square

feet), wetlands located within the shoreland wetland protection zone, but beyond the shoreland building setback zone up to 100 square feet, and wetlands within the shoreland building setback zone (as defined in the local shoreland management ordinance) up to 20 square feet.

Note, the above statute updates are highlighted for relevancy, but are brief and summarized. Additional updates to the WCA were not included within this article. If you have any questions, need additional information regarding WCA updates, or have potential projects that could impact wetlands (fill, excavation, or drainage) call the Todd County Soil and Water at 320-732-2644.

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Big plays send Cardinals to state championship game with 36-24 win over Chatfield

Staples-Motley will play in the state football championship after defeating Chatfield 36-24 in the state semifinal on Nov. 15. An offensive outburst in the first half turned into a defensive gem in the second half, as the Cardinals never trailed after getting out to a 16-0 lead.

Staples-Motley scored on their first four drives of the game, with clutch plays contributing to each score. After the Cardinals built up a 30-22 lead, the teams traded turnovers and stops for most of the second half.

Chatfield had been ranked number one in the state by MaxPreps and by MinnesotaScores.net. It was the second straight win against a top ranked team, after their first round win against Barnesville, ranked number one by the StarTribune.

The Cardinals were confident they could play with Chatfield.

“We knew we had a good chance if we went out and executed,” said Drake Dukowitz, a Cardinal line-man.

Linebacker Luke Bjerga agreed. “The more film I watched, the more confident I got. I was not nervous by the time the game started,” said Bjerga.

That confidence came down to preparation and willpower.

“I worked harder than they did,” said Bjerga, “we desired it more.”

Game summary

The Cardinals took the opening kickoff and started driving with Eli Rutten passing to Alex Schultz and Colbe Tappe gaining yards on the ground. They converted a short fourth down on a run by Tappe, then faced fourth and 13. Rutten hit Schultz for a 29 yard pass over the middle to the two yard line and Tappe ran it in from there. Rutten threw to Schultz for the two point conversion and an 8-0 lead.

When Chatfield got the ball, they ran four straight running plays and the Cardinals stuffed them on fourth and two for a turnover on downs. That stop was crucial because after that, Chatfield abandoned their game plan to run the ball on every play, mixing in passes for every drive.

Starting at the 39 yard line, the Cardinals earned a

first down on a penalty, then Ben Tyrrell ran for 16 yards to the seven. Rutten hit Conner Kuhns for a touchdown and Turner Beachy caught a pass for the extra point and a 16-0 lead.

“They were the top ranked team, I think that hurt their pride a little,” said Bjerga.

More importantly, it gave Staples-Motley an idea on how to win the game.

“They couldn’t stop our offense, we just had to make one more stop and the game is over,” said Bjerga. “But it took us a while to get that stop.”

Chatfield responded. They passed for a first down and then two big run plays got them into the end zone to make the score 16-6.

The Cardinals went back to work with Rutten completing passes to Beachy and Schultz for first downs. They converted another 4th down play when facing 4th and seven at the 14 yard line. Rutten passed over the middle to Tappe, who dove into the end zone while making the catch for a touchdown. The Cardinals came up short on the extra point but still had a 22-6 lead.

The Cardinals were confident they could make the big plays on third and fourth down. “It’s playing like we did back in recess, just I’ll throw it up and you come down with it,” said Bjerga.

Chatfield responded with another steady drive, scoring and converting the extra point to make the score 22-14.

The Cardinals responded quickly when Tappe burst through the middle on a run and weaved past defenders for a 51 yard touchdown run. Tyrrell caught the two point conversion to put Staples-Motley up 30-14.

Chatfield scored even quicker when they passed to an uncovered receiver who ran it in for a touchdown, making it 30-22.

Staples-Motley continued to move the ball with Beachy catching a pass and Tappe getting a big run into Chatfield territory. On third and eight, Rutten passed to Schultz on a deep pass and he fell down at the one yard line. The Cardinals were poised to score their fifth touchdown, but a fumble at the one gave the ball back.

Chatfield had a chance to tie the game before halftime. They made two big pass plays and got down to the

14 yard line. Drake Dukowitz knocked them back seven yards with a quarterback sack. On third down, Steven Petrich rushed the quarterback and forced a quick throw, where Beachy stepped in front of the pass for an interception, preserving the 30-22 lead.

At halftime, the Staples-Motley players felt they were in position to win the game.

“We were saying that this is the biggest half of our life,” said Bjerga.

Second half

After both teams raced up and down the field in the first half, the Cardinals changed their defensive strategy.

“We knew what was coming, we just had to stop it,” said Bjerga.

“Our coaches and defensive backs made some adjustments to what they were doing,” said Dukowitz. We knew we could stop the run so they were going to throw more often. The defensive line could focus on getting to the quarterback.”

On the first drive of the second half, Adrian Gomez and Bjerga blew up running plays and Chatfield missed on a pass, setting up the first punt of the entire game.

Staples-Motley moved downfield again, but a long pass by Rutten got picked off at the five yard line for a second turnover.

Chatfield started driving, but fumbled the ball and Dustin Converse recovered to get the ball back at the 39

yard line.

Staples-Motley gave it back with a fumble on their next drive.

Chatfield got backed up to the four yard line and tried to pass out of it. Beachy defended a pass play and on the next play, Dukowitz pressured the quarterback, who threw it downfield, where Schultz picked it off for an interception at the 13 yard line.

After turnovers ended their last three drives, the Cardinals made sure they got the score this time. Tappe had a 12 yard run, then punched it in for the touchdown late in the third quarter. They missed the extra point but were still up by two scores, 36-22.

Entering the fourth quarter, Chatfield started pulling out all the stops in an effort to crack the Staples-Motley defense. They drove to the Cardinal 33, but Sawyer Ferdon knocked them backwards with a sack. Tappe stopped a running play, then Dukowitz and Jacob Becker got to the quarterback for another six yard loss. On 4th and 23, Chatfield punted to the Cardinal eight.

Staples-Motley gained a few yards but were forced to punt. The snap flew past the punter and out of the end zone for a safety, making the score 36-24 and the Cardinals had to kick it back to Chatfield, who started with great field position.

Once again the defense came up big. Gomez and Converse made a stop on first down, Petrich blew up

a running play on second down, and Gavin Chenoweth broke up a pass on third down. On 4th and six, Bjerga hurried the quarterback, who threw incomplete, giving the ball back to Staples-Motley.

After suffering from mistakes for much of the second half, the Cardinal offense took control of the game again, just as they had done in the first half. With 4:23 left in the game, the Cardinals were confident they could run out the clock.

“For sure we were going to run it out,” said Bjerga.

Tappe gained a first down on an 11 yard run. Three plays later, Tappe gained 15 yards on 3rd and four. With Chatfield using up their time outs, the Cardinals were able to kneel down and run out the clock on their final three plays.

After an entire game of battling through tough plays, kneeling down gave the team a chance to realize they were going to the state championship.

“It didn’t feel real,” said Bjerga.

Playing at state

The Staples-Motley players said it was a very different feel to play at US Bank Stadium, with the Minnesota Vikings emblem on the field.

“Playing outdoors, you don’t get tired at all,” said Dukowitz. “In the dome, I was tired in the second quarter.”

The players felt they had an advantage after playing their section final in the

Fargo Dome, while Chatfield was playing their first indoor game of the season.

Another advantage for Staples-Motley was the large crowd cheering every play.

“It is super cool seeing the whole town there,” said Dukowitz. “For Friday’s game, there are places closing, it is great that they do that to support the team.”

Staples-Motley advanced with a 36-24 win over Chatfield in the semifinal. They will play Jackson County Central, who beat Kimball 34-26 in their semifinal. In that game, JCC was behind 26-20 in the fourth quarter before scoring the final two touchdowns for the win.

Walking the hallways of Staples-Motley High School while preparing for the state final is a new experience for the Staples-Motley team.

“It’s surreal, almost,” said player Drake Dukowitz.

“It’s hard to believe,” said player Luke Bjerga.

It is belief that has gotten the team this far, because they have been preparing for it for years.

“We’ve been talking about this for a long time,” said Bjerga.

“In middle school, Arden Beachy told us we were going to be the grade to do this.”

Telling stories of the great CC teams

Farber was valued volunteer for Cardinal CC teams

After the 1998-99 Staples-Motley cross country teams were inducted into the school’s athletic hall of fame, some of the team members met up with Terry Farber, to honor the many hours of volunteer work that Farber put into the team.

Coach Gene Mattila was joined by runners Chad Brever and Dan Huebsch to reminisce with Farber on Oct. 6.

Mattila said when he took over the program from Jerry Riewer, he noticed that Coach Riewer always said “we” and never said “I” when talking about the team. That was one thing he continued with the program.

Although there is no “I” in “team,” there is an “I” in “winner,” said Mattila, meaning that the individuals like Farber were a large part of the program.

“Terry was a part of that system, he was our go-to guy,” said Mattila. “When kids got upset, I would tell them to ‘go talk to Farber,’” said Mattila.

Farber took fundraising to the community to support the teams as they were climbing in the state rankings and started winning championships. He got donations locally and as far away as some casinos in Minnesota.

Huebsch said because of the fundraising, the teams got warmup suits that made them appear to be on the cutting edge of athletic style. In addition, they had one of the largest teams among small

schools in Minnesota.

“When we showed up, the other teams were intimidated,” said Huebsch.

Farber said they started getting a reputation around the country. When they would go to events out of state, he would talk to people who knew about the Staples-Motley teams.

Farber was known for cheering loudly as the runners competed, while Mattila was taking notes on how to improve for the next meet. Farber remembered one time they gave him the job to read split times to the Cardinal runners, but he got reprimanded because he was yelling it too loudly and telling everyone in the race.

“I never got mad at Terry,” said Mattila.

Farber was also an off-season coach, making sure the summer workouts were done correctly. Huebsch remembers doing two-a-day workouts in the summer with Farber always there because rules did not allow team coaches to be at the practices.

Huebsch said those workouts might be 12 miles in the morning and another 12 or 13 in the afternoon, meaning they ran almost a full marathon in one day and Farber was there for them.

Farber would do potato feeds for the team, getting the potatoes from area farmers and hosting meals at his house. He also brought bananas and other foods to meets so runners had nutrition after their runs.

Although Farber now sometimes struggles with memory, he said he still re-

members the races that his son Charlie ran for the team.

Farber became involved in the intricacies of the Staples-Motley cross country system. He remembers one year when Charlie was doing great in workouts but couldn’t finish the races well. As they did with every runner on the team, Mattila and Farber started investigating what was going on with the races and found out that his heart rate was too high before the races. “He was too pumped up before the meet,” said Mattila.

Terry remembers that once they figured out the issue, Charlie went out and won his race.

Farber remembers some of the legendary stories that came from that era, such as the time Jason Tholl came back and beat everyone while wearing combat boots.

Huebsch remembered road trips with Farber and his son Charlie. One year they drove to Buffalo, NY, to run in a U.S. Track and Field national event. While there, they attended a rap concert by 50 Cent and JayZ, which they thought Terry wouldn’t enjoy, but he remembers having a good time.

Farber was also known for his Cardinal van, decorated with team stickers.

Huebsch and Mattila also said that Farber was not just helpful to the boys team, he felt the girls team was just as important.

While Farber reminisced with the former team, he said he could tell a lot more stories about what made his volunteer hours worthwhile.



Wadena County shooting sports teams earn medals at state tournament

The Minnesota State shooting sports & wildlife invitational was held in Alexandria in September, with 723 Minnesota youth from 59 counties attending. Minnesota youth participated in a multiple of disciplines from Archery, Air Rifle, Air Pistol, Trap, .22 Rifle, muzzleloader, silhouette, wildlife calling and skillathon.

Wadena County was well represented with 29 youth attending, bringing home a total of 49 medals.

Every county, after a designated number of educational hours, is required to present a wildlife project before a judge at the state shoot. They present their chosen project and are judged together in an oral interview.

The main focus for shooting sports is to teach youth the safe handling and keeping of firearms and archery equipment and about wildlife. 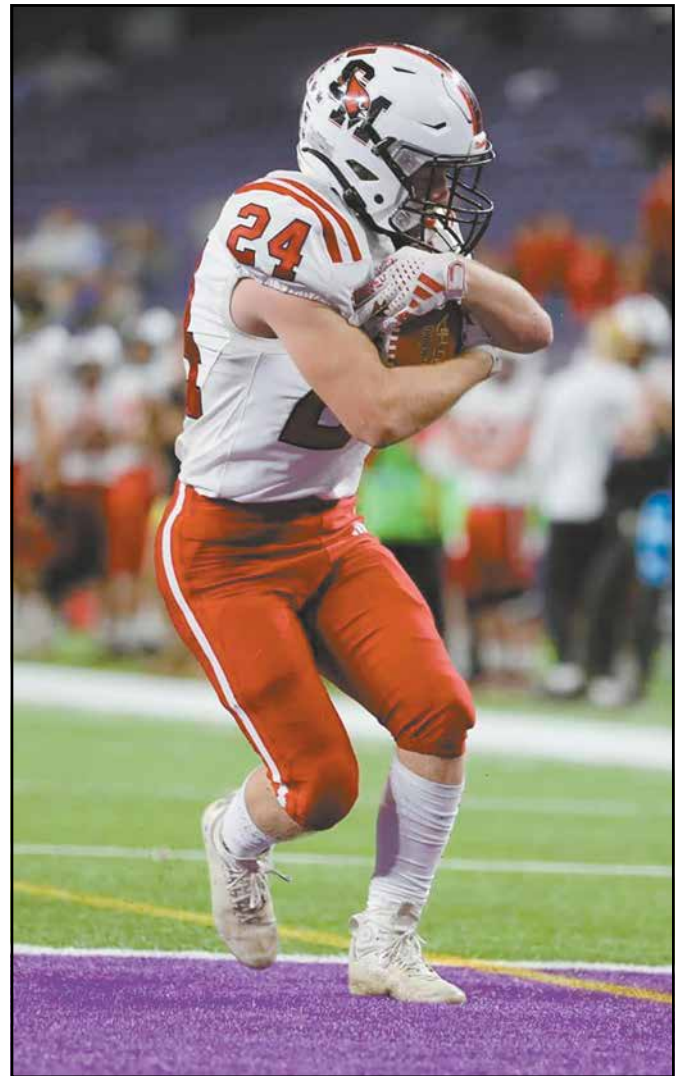
